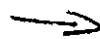

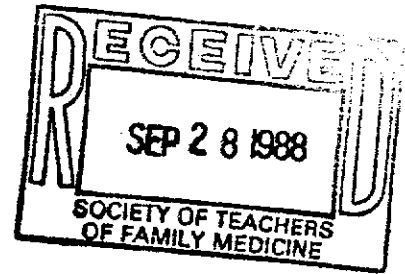

This is a summary report on the second Advanced Forum in Family Medicine held at Keystone resort in Colorado September 7-11, 1988.

There were 81 attendees, including 55 registrants and 26 family members. A few had to leave early, but attendance at all scheduled activities was remarkable consistent.

The list of registrants who attended is enclosed. In addition, there were 8 paid registrants who did not attend and whose fees have been refunded.

Registrants who attended included 47 physicians and 7 PhD's, almost all of whom are involved in medical education or medical administration, mainly in Family Medicine. Eight were women, evenly split between physicians and PhD's.

The group included 13 current chairpersons and 7 former chairpersons of Departments of Family Medicine, and 10 past or current presidents of STFM. The chief executive officers of AAFP and STFM attended. Overseas guests were John Richards from Auckland, N.Z., and Joseph Levenstein from Capetown, R.S.A.

The program was approved for 20 hours prescribed credit by the AAFP. A copy showing speakers and titles is included. All but three of the presentations were given by volunteers from the list of paid registrants. The exceptions were invited speakers; Dr. Regina Morantz-Sanchez, Professor of History at UCLA, Dr. Charles Odegaard, President Emeritus, University of Washington, former member of The Millis Commission, and currently consultant to The Kaiser Family Foundation, and Dr. Joseph Levenstein. Prof. Morantz-Sanchez was the only paid speaker.

The general theme of the meeting was "The Uses of History in Clinical Work," however a number of other topics were presented about the past, current, and future of Family Practice as a specialty. Prominent among these were: the impact of "managed care," the relative merits of the biopsychosocial paradigm of medical care, women's issues in medicine, and potential new relationships among primary care disciplines, especially Family Medicine and General Internal Medicine.

There was a good mix of theoretical, practical, political, economic, and personal topics. The discussion periods were lively and participation in them was general.

There was no formal evaluation of the program, but personal comments were favorable and several spoke to me about a sense of renewal, even inspiration. It is clear that everything is not rosy in Family Medicine these days, either for the discipline as a whole or for individual faculty members and practitioners; however there is a spirit of clear-headed optimism that problems can be solved and that many of our ideals are still valid. Our naive romance with reform in medical education and practice has been blunted and toughened by experience, but the spirit of reform is alive in this group.

I believe that there is an important role for this sort of meeting occasionally, to recapture some of our original enthusiasm and informality in talking to each other about our ideas and experiences, to share that among generations of leaders, and to recharge our batteries in a setting that is not preoccupied with system maintenance. This meeting does not, by any means, take the place of formal organizational meetings, and it would lose its effectiveness if it were repeated too often, but once in a while it serves a purpose.

I wish to express my thanks to the Foundation for supporting the meeting and giving it legitimacy. I will furnish a financial report as soon as the accounting is completed. Already, I can see that expenses were a little less than income and I will return any unused funds to the Foundation.
